




In this latest update, ACSL again combines legal research with computational methods to measure the capacity of cities. The Capacity Index ranks all municipalities against three measures of capacity over the period 2013 - 2016.

The research shows that the capacity of municipalities (and the major cities in particular) has significantly improved in the extent to which municipalities have filled available posts. Section 139 interventions can improve municipal capacity.

This 2nd Working Paper series builds on the Capable Cities Index, a tool that has been instrumental in informing public debate around capable cities (capability referring to consistency in maintaining high levels of capacity, performance and compliance).

It has been referred widely and included in the South African Cities Network's State of South African Cities Report 2016.
