



8. Does the municipality publish procurement information on both its website and the eTender portal?

General assessment:

a) What is your overall impression on how easy it is to navigate the municipal website to find procurement information? Rate out of 10?

It was relatively easy to navigate through the website after a few clicks. Some of the information I was looking for is available but it is not organised properly. I give the municipality a 6/10.

b) Any tips on how the municipality could improve citizens' access to procurement information on its website?

I would suggest the municipality create categories within its procurement page in a logical and clear manner. For example, tenders awarded are grouped together with bid registers from previous years. Also, the municipality should consider publishing tender notices containing relevant information on its website.

c) Are there any best practices in the municipality which can be shared with other municipalities?

This municipality extensively publishes the list of names of companies that have been awarded tenders quite regularly.

d) Are there any other issues that caught your attention when undertaking the assessment?

Not really, I think an ordinary member of the public trying to access procurement information on this website should exercise patience as it requires a few clicks for one to begin to understand how the website functions and where the information is located.
